National - and Local - Incidents of Racism

Like you, we have begun the week shaken by the brutality of racism. The death of Ahmaud Arbery, the death of Breonna Taylor, the disturbing and false accusation against Christian Cooper in Central Park (our own neighborhood), and the recent murder of George Floyd have all of us dealing with a wide range of emotions including anger, helplessness, and the desire to act.

The challenges of the pandemic combined with the inhumane acts unfolding before our eyes necessitate conversation and action. I am confident that our Lafayette Academy families feel a sense of urgency and the same call to action on your part as humans, parents, and members of a school community so focused on social justice.

We have created a survey for students, which will be sent out soon, who wish to participate in listening circles in the very near future utilizing a specific <u>listening circle on George Floyd</u> protocol from <u>The Morningside Center</u>. This is entirely optional.

For people unfamiliar with the organization's work, the center works with educators to deliver curriculum resources that promote peace and democracy. I have utilized their resources in the past, we have received professional development from them around Restorative Justice, and Morningside works closely with NYC public schools. The protocol is a tight one that provides clear guidelines for facilitating such conversations, including background, discussion prompts, and a play-by-play for facilitation.

Lafayette Academy became notable for countless reasons, and one was for creating an environment, where students are empowered and become globally responsible citizens. You and your children understand our mission and vision in ways I couldn't have imagined when we first opened Lafayette Academy.
